

A Carnival of Animals: Beasts. Birds and Bugs in Original Illustrations from Children's Books will be on view at the Ohio Arts Council's Riffe Gallery January 29 through April 18, 2004. The exhibition includes 80 works by artists from the United States and abroad. An opening reception and Family Day will be held on Sunday, February 1, 2004, from 2-4 p.m. Free tours, art activities and light refreshments will be offered. The event is free and open to the public.

Drawn from the historic Mazza Collection at the University of Findlay, Ohio, A Carnival of Animals invites viewers to explore art in children's literature and helps to deepen their understanding of the process by which original art becomes part of a printed book. Viewers will be greeted by the

sometimes whimsical, sometimes dramatic and always tender portrayals of the animal world. The exhibition also aims to remind visitors of all ages of the profound connections between humans and animals and the importance of safeguarding the world's precious natural resources.

A Carnival of Animals includes works by artists famous for their contributions to children's literature and seldom seen historical artworks and representations by illustrators from other countries. Randolph J. Caldecott, the 19th century illustrator for whom the Caldecott Medal is named, Columbus artist Christopher Canyon and more than 70 other artists are featured in the exhibition which concludes its 18-city tour at the Riffe Gallery. NEW RESOURCE TAKES OHIO TEACHERS AND STUDENTS ON A LITERARY TREK

The Ohio Arts Council has partnered with Dayton's ThinkTV, the Mazer Corporation and WCET/Cincinnati to develop an innovative multimedia program to engage and stimulate young readers while building literacy skills. *The Ohio Reading Road Trip* is an interactive curriculum package that includes print, video, DVD, internet and broadcast resources designed to help students improve reading skills by sparking their interest in reading.

The curriculum kits, which are aligned with state language arts content standards, will be available to Ohio teachers at no cost in early 2004. In addition, free professional development workshops will be offered to teachers across the state. The program also will fund 20-25 writer-in-residence grants on a competitive basis to schools in districts designated by the State of Ohio as low wealth. The Ohio Reading Road Trip is targeted specifically to the learning needs of 6th, 7th and 8th grade students. The program targets this age group because research has shown that learning motivation declines in the middle school years as students face the physical, social and emotional changes associated with adolescence. The Ohio Reading Road Trip aims to replace "skill and drill" techniques with curriculum that helps students connect with the materials and develop a long lasting appreciation for reading and language arts.

A one-hour literary travelogue of Ohio, will air on public television stations statewide to promote the project. Check local listings for times and dates.
